Each scholarship represents not just individual advancement, but the upliftment of entire communities as these scholars return to serve and lead in their respective areas.

Through our partnership with Project STAR, backed by a \$10 million commitment over four years, we demonstrate our strategic approach to addressing systemic challenges in underserved communities. This collaboration, along with our continued support of Crime Stop Jamaica, and the other social intervention activities carried out by the Foundation, reflects the Board's focus on initiatives that promote social stability and economic growth.

Looking ahead, the Board remains committed to strengthening our corporate governance while expanding our community impact. **Our response to Hurricane Beryl** showed the Foundation's capacity to mobilize resources effectively during crises, **reaching 710 affected households**. This operational efficiency, twinned with strategic planning, positions us to address future challenges.

As we move forward, the Board will continue to focus on initiatives that create lasting impact while ensuring sound governance and efficient resource allocation. We remain dedicated to our role in building stronger, more resilient Jamaican communities through our key pillars.

# CEO'S MESSAGE

# **DEAR STAKEHOLDERS/FRIENDS,**

As I pen my final message as CEO of the JWN Foundation, I reflect on our journey of community transformation and sustainable development. The Foundation has evolved from its nascent stages in 2016 to become a cornerstone of social development in Jamaica, particularly in Kingston, Clarendon, and St. Elizabeth.

Since 2016, we have invested millions, with last year alone seeing an **investment of \$31.8 million in targeted interventions across our three core pillars**: education and infrastructural development, social inclusion, and cultural expression. This investment represents our unwavering commitment to creating lasting change in our communities.

The completion of the **Appleton Basic School**, a labour of love of mine, stands as a testament to our vision for educational excellence. With an **investment of more than \$165 million**, this facility will serve as more than just a school—it will be a beacon of community development in Northeast St. Elizabeth, offering both early childhood education and adult learning opportunities.

This investment in physical infrastructure goes hand in hand with our commitment to human capital development through our scholarship program, ensuring we create both the spaces and opportunities for learning to flourish.

Our scholarship program has grown exponentially, now supporting 346 students with disbursements of over JMD \$26.3 million. This represents a significant expansion from our initial cohort in 2014 where we offered 14 scholarships \$317,000. Our continued expansion reflects our commitment to educational access and excellence.

Our commitment to innovation has led us to create programs that touch lives in profound ways. The **DJ Training Summer Camp** opened new career pathways for **young people in Spanish Town Road and St. Elizabeth**, transforming their

passion for music into viable professional skills. Through our "End Period Poverty" campaign, we've restored dignity to young women across 21 institutions, distributing 1,850 menstrual kits and breaking down barriers to education and employment. We have come a far way with this program from when we started in 2020 where we donated 650 packages to 13 institutions. These initiatives represent our understanding that community development requires addressing both obvious and often-overlooked needs. All these programs could not have been successful without the help of our employee volunteers. They have remained resolute in the mandate of the Foundation, donating their time, effort and money to the cause. I am particularly moved by the dedication of our 94 Camparista volunteers who last year contributed 1,621.6 hours in 2024. Even though it's a far cry from 2021 where 103 volunteers contributed 3347 hours, it showcases the continued spirit of the importance of employee volunteerism to the development of the communities in which we operate. Their service embodies the spirit of community partnership that has been the cornerstone of our foundation's success.

As I prepare to pass the torch, I am proud of the foundation we have built together. What began as a corporate social responsibility initiative has transformed into a robust institution that touches thousands of lives annually. The partnerships we've fostered position us well for continued impact.

To our partners, stakeholders, and especially the communities we serve: your trust and collaboration have been instrumental in our success.

The future of the J. Wray & Nephew Foundation is bright, and I am confident that the seeds we have planted will continue to bear fruit for generations to come.

ead Across Jamaica Day 2024 demonstrated JWNF's continued commitment to educational development through a strategic literacy initiative. The Foundation donated copies of "I Am a Promise" by Jamaican Olympian Shelly-Ann Fraser-Pryce and Ashley Rousseau to twelve focus schools' libraries.

The book selection aligned with the Olympic year, featuring Fraser-Pryce's inspiring journey from Kingston's Waterhouse community to her 2008 Olympic gold medal in the 100-meter sprint.

The initiative engaged 32 Camparistas who conducted reading sessions for students in grades 1-4, directly reaching 2,706 students. Through the library donations, the program has the potential to impact approximately 7,000 students across all twelve participating schools. The total investment in this initiative was JMD \$582,955.00 (€3,511.98).

# International NOMEN'S DAY ACTIVATION #EndPeriodPoverty

WN Foundation's commitment to women's empowerment and social responsibility reached new heights in 2024 through two transformative initiatives. The Foundation's End Period Poverty Campaign made significant strides in addressing menstrual health accessibility, successfully distributing 1,850 menstrual kits across 21 institutions in Kingston, Clarendon, and St. Elizabeth.



This impactful initiative, valued at JMD \$1,687,749.34 (€10,167.75), was further strengthened by community support through pledges, volunteer efforts, and donations totaling JMD509,900.00 (€3,071.86).















Ahead of the period poverty initiative, JWN Corporate celebrated International Women's Day on March 8, 2024, with the Spirited Women Luncheon, honoring 11 remarkable women from the company's groundbreaking digital series. "Spirited Women" showcases the achievements of female entrepreneurs who have excelled across various segments of the spirits industry. At the luncheon, the annual End Period Poverty Campaign, was officially launched with the attendees pledging over \$285,000 to support the purchase of sanitary napkins. 10 cases of sanitary napkins, along with other female hygiene products were also donated.

# Hurricane BERYL RELIEF

n the aftermath of Hurricane Beryl, J. Wray & Nephew Foundation (JWNF) mounted a comprehensive emergency response initiative in the severely impacted parishes of Clarendon and St. Elizabeth.



The Foundation coordinated the procurement and distribution of **710** care packages, with valuable support from the Lasco Chin Foundation, which contributed **60** packages along with essential hydration supplies. JWNF employees demonstrated exceptional corporate citizenship by volunteering their time to assemble these relief packages, which were strategically distributed to affected households, including company staff members residing in the disaster zones. To address critical infrastructure challenges, the Foundation also provided rental generators to the most severely affected communities, enabling residents to charge mobile phones and other vital electronic devices. This humanitarian initiative, which exemplified JWNF's dedication to community welfare and corporate social responsibility, represented a total investment of JMD \$7,819,591.16 (€47,106).

# Appleton Basic SCHOOL RENOVATION

Siloah, St. Elizabeth

he Appleton Basic School Renovation Project in Siloah, St. Elizabeth represents a significant investment in early childhood education and community development. With a total investment of JMD \$92 million, construction progressed throughout 2024 to create Northeast St. Elizabeth's most advanced educational facility.

The modernized campus features purpose-built classrooms equipped with essential health and safety measures, including dedicated sanitization areas and designs that facilitate social distancing. The facility incorporates sustainable technology through solar lighting systems and rainwater harvesting infrastructure. Additional amenities include a nursery, multipurpose auditorium for skills training, school garden, and playground area.

Beyond serving as an educational institution for young learners, the new Appleton Basic School is designed to function as a **community hub**, following the successful model of the Middlesex Early Childhood Institution. The facility will **offer adult education programs** focusing on literacy enhancement and practical skills development, including courses in parenting, entrepreneurship, business management, and project management.

Through its comprehensive design and programming, the Appleton Basic School will provide opportunities for academic foundation building while fostering practical life skills through agricultural education and sports activities.

he J. Wray & Nephew Foundation launched an innovative webinar program designed to enhance scholarship application skills among previous applicants. The "Interview to Success" webinar, held on June 28, provided comprehensive guidance on application completion, essay writing, and interview preparation.



The initiative featured presentations from both JWNF representatives and external industry experts.

The program generated significant interest following its June 17 launch, attracting 493 website visits. The webinar achieved a remarkable 98% attendance rate, with 54 of 55 registered participants attending the session. Through strategic partnerships and volunteer engagement, the Foundation maintained minimal operational costs, with total expenditure limited to JMD \$25,000.00 (€150.61) for marketing activities.



# Teacher's Day BIGUP

The JWN Foundation demonstrated its commitment to education through its Teacher's Day Big Up initiative, recognizing educators across three parishes. The foundation honored 680 teachers from 20 supported institutions, spanning early childhood, primary, and high schools in Kingston, Clarendon, and St. Elizabeth. Each educator received supermarket vouchers as a token of appreciation.



In addition to the general recognition, the foundation introduced a special recognition program where principals selected their top five performing teachers. These outstanding educators were awarded an exclusive VIP experience at the Joy Spence Appleton Estate Rum Experience (JSAERE). Through this program, 94 teachers enjoyed the premium tour, valued at JMD \$321,600.00 (€1,937.46).

The foundation's total investment in the Teacher's Day Big Up initiative amounted to JMD \$1,096,100.00 (€6,603.39), reflecting its substantial commitment to acknowledging and rewarding educational excellence in Jamaica.





The Foundation's flagship Community & Camparistas Scholarship Programme awarded 199 scholarships valued at JMD \$22,240,000 (€132,950.23). Additionally, through the Holland **Estate and Sugar Transformation initiatives**, the Foundation provided **Special Scholastic** Support grants to 147 recipients, with a total value of JMD \$4,075,000 (€24,360.26) for the upcoming academic year. These investments reflect the JWN Foundation's ongoing dedication to fostering educational opportunities and community development.







# AGRO-PRENEURSHIP Initiative

Social Inclusion

he JWN Foundation demonstrated significant growth in its agro-preneurship initiative during 2024, marking a strategic expansion from its original St. Elizabeth launch site in 2021 to now include Kingston and Clarendon.



This expansion brought 100 new contributions to the program, reinforcing JWNF's commitment to fostering sustainable agricultural entrepreneurship across Jamaica.

At the core of this initiative is a comprehensive approach to poultry farming, where participants receive multifaceted support encompassing financial literacy education, specialized skills training, and access to vital resources. This holistic support system is designed to equip aspiring agro-preneurs with the tools and knowledge necessary for long-term success.

The Foundation's dedication to this initiative is reflected in its substantial investment of JMD \$1,444,299 (€8,701.10), underscoring its commitment to community development and economic empowerment throughout Jamaica.








# International COASTAL CLEAN-UP DAY

**Cultural Expression** 

he JWN Foundation hosted a DJ Training Summer Camp for 20 students from beneficiary communities along Spanish Town Road and in St. Elizabeth. The camp, facilitated by DJ Denvo of Open Format Academy and FAME FM, focused on the fundamentals of disc jockeying and music production.



Students aged thirteen to seventeen were introduced to various aspects of deejaying and music production, including mixing, scratching, remixing techniques, audio editing, creating radio advertisements, beat making, and content creation. The camp also included a field trip to a local radio station. The DJ Summer Camp program aimed to provide a positive and constructive outlet for young people in the community while teaching them valuable skills that would benefit them throughout their lives. The camp emphasized the importance of structure, expression, teamwork, and self-confidence in the lives of the participants. This initiative costed JMD \$1,675,969.00 (€10,096.78).



# International VOLUNTEER DAY

he J. Wray & Nephew (JWN) Foundation celebrated International Volunteer Day on Thursday, October 5, 2024, by recognizing our dedicated volunteer workforce who contributed 1,622 volunteer hours in 2024 - eclipsing 2023's numbers of 900 hours.



Through ten key interventions across its 3 pillars of education, social inclusion and culture, our volunteers helped deliver transformative community initiatives including scholarship programs benefiting 199 students (valued at over \$167 million), youth development projects in Spanish Town Road, Appleton and New Yarmouth areas, and creative arts training for 20 students in disc jockeying and music production.

The Board of Directors is responsible for overseeing the Foundation's financial reporting process.









### 1. Identification and Activities

JWN Foundation (the Foundation) was incorporated on 27 May 2014 as a limited liability company by guarantee not have a share capital. The registered office of the Foundation is 23 Dominica Drive,

## 2. Purpose of the Foundation Objects

The Foundation is a non-profit public benefit corporation, and it is not organised for the private gain of any person. The purposes for which this Foundation is formed are exclusively charitable within the meaning of the Charities Act, 2013 and include the following:

- (i) the advancement of education by inter alia providing financial support to schools and other institutions of learning, the provision of scholarships and aid to students including the supply of books, stipends, scholarships, exhibitions, prizes, grants, awards, educational career sport, bursaries, and other incentives for the purpose of the advancement of knowledge, education, and
- (ii) the advance of amateur sport by inter alia the establishment and funding of sports development programmes, the sponsorship of sporting events, establishing and/or providing financial and other support to sporting facilities;
- (iii) the advancement of health and the savings of lives by inter alia providing and assisting in the provision of medical facilities, support services and medical equipment, funding medical research and community health programmes.
- (iv) the advancement of good citizenship and/or community development;
- (v) the advancement of environmental protection or improvement through inter alia the funding and or promotion of programmes designed to protect the environment and to advance environmental awareness and to promote and support initiatives which focuses on the preservation and sustainability of the environment;
- (vi) the prevention or the relief of poverty in Jamaica; and
- (vii) the advancement of any other charitable purpose determined by the Board of Directors and classified as a charitable purpose under the Charities Act, 2013.

The Foundation currently holds funding and/or grants received from Fondazione Campari in trust which is allocated solely for use for the benefit of employees of J. Wray & Nephew Limited and their direct descendants pending written authorization from the Director of Human Resources of JWN. This funding should be used for this sole purpose and for no other purpose whatsoever based on the governing caveat issued by Fondazione Campari and accepted by the Board of Directors of the JWN Foundation in the meeting of the Board of Directors of the JWN Foundation of June 30, 2018 upon receipt of said funds.

# 3. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

# (a) Basis of preparation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) and have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with IFRS requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the company's accounting policies. Although these estimates are based on management's best knowledge of current events and action, actual results could differ from those estimates.

## (a) Basis of preparation (continued)

# Standards, interpretation, and amendments to published standards effective in the current

Certain new standards, interpretation and amendments to existing standards have been published that became effective during the current financial period. The Foundation has assessed the relevance of all such new standards, interpretations and amendments and has concluded that none is relevant to its operations.

## Standards, interpretations, and amendments to published standards that are not yet effective

At the date of authorisation of these financial statements, certain new standards, interpretations, and amendments to existing standards have been issued which are mandatory for the Foundation's accounting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2024 or later periods, but were not effective at the year end, and which the Foundation has not early adopted. The Foundation has assessed the relevance of all such new standards, interpretations, and amendments, and has determined that none is expected to have a material effect on the financial statements of the Foundation.

# (b) Revenue recognition

# Funding and contributions.

The Foundation would expect to receive funding and/or grants from

- (i) Fondazione Campari
- (ii) J. Wray & Nephew Ltd (JWN)
- (iii) Donor agencies that may partner with the entity on CSR projects.
- (iv) JWN Foundation funding raised independently through fund raising activities

Contributions are recognised when received.

# Interest income

Interest income is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income on a time proportion basis using the effective interest method. When a receivable is impaired, the company reduces the carrying amount to its recoverable amount, being the estimated future cash flow discounted at the original effective interest rate and continues unwinding the discount as interest income.

## (c) Awards and grants

Awards and grants are recorded when committed

## (d) Foreign currency translation

(i) Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements of the company are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which it operates (the functional currency). The financial statements are presented in Jamaican dollars which is also the company's functional currency.

## (ii) Transactions and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at year-end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

# (e) Financial instruments

Financial instruments carried on the statement of financial position include cash and bank balances and other liabilities. The fair value of the company's financial instruments approximates their carrying values.

# (f) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are stated at cost. For the purposes of the cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank.

# 4. Financial Risk Management

The Foundations activities expose it to liquidity, currency, and credit risks. The Foundation is not significantly exposed to interest rate risk as it has no interest-bearing assets or liabilities other than cash at bank. Management seeks to minimise potential adverse effects on the financial performance of the Foundation by applying procedures to identify, evaluate and manager the liquidity, currency, and credit risks, based on guidelines set by the Board of Directors.

The Foundation complies with the risk management policies of their funding entity which are designed to identify an analyse these risk, to set appropriate risk limits and controls, and to monitor the risks and adherence to limits by means of reliable and up-to-date information systems.

The Board of Directors is ultimately responsible for the establishment and oversight of the risk management framework. They provide principles for overall risk management, as well as policies covering specific areas, such as interest rate risk, currency risk, credit risk and liquidity.

## (a) Credit risk

The Foundation takes on exposure to credit risk, which is the risk that its counterparties will cause a financial loss for the Foundation by failing to discharge their contractual obligations. Credit exposures arise principally from the Foundation's bank balances.

## Maximum exposure to credit risk

The maximum exposure to credit risk, of the company, equal the respective carrying amounts on the statements of financial position, for all financial assets which are subject to credit risk.

# (b) Currency risk

Currency risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in foreign exchange rates.

The Foundation is exposed to foreign exchange risk primarily with respect to cash and bank balances denominate in US dollar. As at 31 December 2024 the statement of financial position includes aggregate foreign assets of approximately US\$ 27,226 (2023 - US\$23,597).

The Foundation manages its foreign exchange risk by ensuring that the net exposure in foreign assets and liabilities is kept to an acceptable level by monitoring currency positions.

# (c) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Foundation is unable to meet is payment obligations associated with its financial liabilities when they fall due. Prudent liquidity risk management implies maintaining sufficient cash and bank balances, the availability of funding from sponsor and other committed credit facilities.

# Liquidity risk management process

The Foundation's liquidity management process includes:

- Monitoring future cash flows and liquidity on a regular basis. This incorporates an assessment of expected cash flows.
- (ii) Optimising cash returns on deposits and bank balances.
